Good governance

The current level of **participation of women** in basin councils ranges from **zero to 20%**.

Governments set policy and develop regulations, but **non-state entities** are increasingly **providing the actual water services**.

Effective water governance calls for:


- Greater **public participation**


Principle 10 of the Rio Declaration on Environment and Development stresses the need for **citizen participation in environmental issues**.


